



# Touch, Look, Listen & Learn

Touch, Look, Listen & Learn is a literacy based, two-hour field trip designed for PreK-K students.

The CMA will present engaging, real-life, and hands-on activities that will provide students with many opportunities to identify upper and lower case alphabet letters, sounds of the letters, as well as simple word and picture recognition.

Each of the exhibit station activities are focused on one or more of the following Louisiana Standards.
